unite, notwithstanding these smaller differences." When I was in my 30's and looking for a home church for my family and me, I checked out the First UMC of Westfield Mass. I had gone to more conservative evangelical churches when I was young, but in the Methodist theology of John Wesley I found the true heart for Christ. In Methodism we are called to look beyond political opinions, doctrines, dogmas, and biases and attend to the command of "love thy neighbor." John Wesley also wrote that a Methodist is not what they believe, they are what they do. Love is an action verb. It is a verb of doing, of movement and change. Love requires much from us. Where we do not love passionately or pathologically, we must love practically (Emmanuel Kant).

In the upcoming election season, we will be faced with folks who differ from us. Can we respond to them with love? As our denomination faces an imminent schism, can we not at the very least be loving towards those who would seek another path apart from us? In your personal life, family and friends will try your patience, test your mettle, and sometimes wound your soul. Can you still be a Methodist? Can you still love those who hurt you? I think that is the great test of our times; to love without limits, to see beyond difference and offer love and welcome.

Why should they remain part of the church when they grow up if the church has not valued and loved them?

Covenant Disciple Group

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

From July 19 to September 20 Tuesday evenings from 6 to 8pm, instead of a Tuesday night Bible Study, I am asking that you consider being a part of a Covenant Disciple Group. What is a Covenant Disciple Group? It is a small group spiritual formation cohort with the purpose of encouraging one another in spiritual growth as we journey on towards perfection, as well as supporting one another as we struggle with the many issues that we might encounter daily. Ideally a group will consist of 12 people who are committed to attending at least 9 of the 10 meetings. If you don't think you can make that commitment, I would ask that you wait for one of the future groups to participate in. Part of the covenant is regular participation. You will need to be able to count on one another. My participation in the group is largely exemplar and eventually supervisory. In other words, I will lead in the beginning, and a few of you will in turn lead the group.

The format is simple. We gather for a potluck, then we gather afterwards for a devotional, a time of prayer, and then a time of personal sharing focused on the traditional Wesleyan question "How is it with your soul?" Of course, there are other commitments like daily prayer and scripture readings and personal reflection on Wesley's "22 questions" (he asks a lot of questions, doesn't he?) My is that 10 weeks of discipline together you will experience growth in journey with Christ, and have a deeper well of faith to draw upon. Please consider making this commitment. If the number exceeds 12, we will split into 2 or more groups as needed.

RSVP by July 14. If you are interested and Tuesday does not work for you, let me know, we may find a different day/time for a second group.

A closer look at Annual Conference resolution RS-22-224

Seeing our buildings as community assets

In June, the 2022 Annual Conference authorized the formation of a community development corporation (CDC) Asenarate mission-based nonprofit, the CDC will work with the Conference to come alongside churches to explore using their buildings and/or sites in innovative ways to support mission and strengthen community engagement.

The CDC, as proposed by <u>R5-22-</u> <u>224</u>, would offer consulting services, legal and property development expertise, and sale and repurposing resources to New England churches. It will begin under the auspices of the United Methodist Foundation of New England and eventually become an independent entity.

Foundation President Ted Crass said a rough estimate based on sta-

tistical reports would put the Conference's property assets at \$1 billion.

But for many congregations, maintenance and deferred maintenance on their buildings and property are burdens draining resources and thwarting mission. The focus of this CDC is to change that perspective — transforming churches' physical assets into tools for effective stewardship and discipleship.

One way to make that shift is to see properties not just as church assets but as community assets.

"This little shift puts our church in our community, our congregation in the community, saying 'What does our community need?' 'How can [our ministry] be a part of that?'" Rev. Crass said.

Some examples might be:

- assisted living
- affordable housing

- senior centers
- art centers
- youth centers

However, Rev. Crass said, churches often don't have the personnel or the expertise to accurately assess what

their community needs or the real worth or condition of their buildings

to deter-

mine how

their property might help fill those needs, and that's where the CDC would come in.
