Week One: Religionless Christianity: no sense of transcendence

After reading the readings for the week reflect on these two ideas of Dietrich Bonhoeffer.

Bonhoeffer: Belief in omni-potent God is more an expression of psychological needs than of

genuine transcendence. Is not peoples weakness (stupidity, forgetfulness, cowardice, vanity etc.) a greater danger than evil?

Week Three: Consumer Christianity: a modern expression of an old desire

Toqueville suggests that institutional equality leads to the next stratification- wealth. The world is no longer noble and peasant, but rich and poor. "One usually finds that love of money might eventually extinguish our spirit." The ideals of our society are seen through the lens of consumerism. Even church has become a product which is consumed on Sunday. Consumers of the religious experience have no deep connection to the faith community, or feel an obligation to be an integral part of the Christian experience which used to be described as Evangelism.

Week Four: Religion as Ultimate Concern

Paul Tillich argued that there is a danger in radicalizing Christianity. Christianity in its proper context has depth and dimension that exceeds our culture. Culture can be

limiting to the religious experience when it tries to bed the experience to culture instead of culture bending to

the Divine. Consider the following questions as your read the scripture lessons:

Is this passage literal and if so, how does this affect culture or reality?

Where have I experienced this passage being radicalized by segments of the church?

When I experience the truth of this passage in my life, do I ask "where God is in this?"

Week Five: Rapid Social Change: how social contexts change the way engage our faith

Dean R Kelley wrote in 1971 that in uncertain times, with social upheaval, people will gravitate towards the certainty of doctrine and dogma. Churches that offer answers to why "scary" things are happening, are sought out by people who are afraid deep down. They ignore the ugly rhetoric, or worse, justify it for their sense of comfort.

As you read the verse, try to think of three issues in modern society that some factions of Christianity have offered simplistic answers to, that have been harmful to the identity of the church.
