Pastor's Greetings Brothers and Sisters!

I've been thinking a lot lately about the passage form Matthew 10:16 "Behold, I send you forth as sheep in the midst of wolves; be ye therefore

wise as serpent...." This verse is seldom read aloud in "lectionary based" churches like ours. It appears only as an optional addendum to another reading, which many ministers of the gospel leave out because the words make them uncomfortable. I think of this verse whenever I read of the unjust steward from Luke 16:8 "The master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly. For the people of this world are more shrewd in dealing with their own kind than are the people of the light."

I think when we examine what it means to live as a Christian in the post-modern world, it is important that our Christian witness (the evidence of transformational work the Spirit has done in our lives) should reflect ethical, thoughtful, empathetic and responsible behaviors. Does that mean I cannot be shrewd? Does that mean I cannot take decisive action with assertive resolve in ways that benefit me, my family and my church? I am a believer in middle way. So much of our culture asks us to skew to the extremes. There are bad Christian witnesses along the entire spectrum of Christianity. Some might read the above Bible passages and see them as an excuse to be unethical in business or life in general. They defend their actions as "shrewd." They conveniently leave out the rest of that verse (just as I did) which reads, "and harmless as doves." Or they might say that Jesus commended the unjust steward. But, the conveniently leave out Jesus' continued commentary in which he says, "Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches?"

Jesus calls us to faithful service. Faithfulness means we trust that if we do the right thing, God will be pleased with what we do, and trust us further with more. But who would ever trust that unjust servant again? What employer would hire them and give them a position of responsibility in the future? Christians must make sound decisions in life, but we cannot ignore ethics, faith, and especially our Christian witness. Wise as serpents but harmless as doves; we won't be taken advantage of, but we also don't take advantage of others. Be faithful with what has been given to us, and trust that God will bless it further.





Grace Notes

from Christine Collins, music minister

Grace notes: 'ornamental notes, usually played quickly before the beat'. Found in all kinds of music from classical to contemporary, these little notes around the main tone embellish the story for us. They bring the tone into focus and tug on our emotional heartstrings as creatures that innately seek resolution.

As we enter into a fresh new year with both trepidation and hope I find myself searching for such resolution. When will it be 'safe' to sing again? How shall I go about rebuilding our choir and ministry? Wouldn't it be nice to go back to 'before' when we had it 'so good'? As a church, like all churches we feel strong and comforting ties with our history and tradition. Changes to our traditions are stressful and make us feel detached and fearful. As time continues on like life's metronome we find ourselves tired of the continual wait for the resolution to that final tonic note.

How do we find peace and satisfaction in a piece so dissonant and jarring with no predictable end in sight? We appreciate the grace notes, those small, seemingly insignificant moments during our day where we are reminded that God's grace surrounds us still, if we take the time to look and listen.

During the time that North Church has been socially distanced we have developed the hybrid ZOOM service and, for all its glitches and hurdles, this has become a wonderful blessing and a way to reach those who- even before the pandemic had struggled to stay in touch with our church family. This is grace. It is my hope that when we do return to the 'new normal' we don't actually return back to 'before'- as good as it was.

That said I want to embrace this technology and marry it to the message that I have been hammering at for the past fifteen years. 'Worship isn't a spectator sport'. Each and all of us experiences God's grace through different eyes and ears and your witness and sharing can be meaningful to someone who might need exactly that message. It is my hope that we might open up our traditional 'anthem' spot in Sunday's worship to such witness. Be it from the center of the sanctuary or remotely on ZOOM, share your talents with the Master. Show us a painting and tell us what inspired you to draw. Dance to a piece that moves your spirit. Read a poem- either one that you love or one that you wrote. Share the story of how God moves you to be what you are.

It is my wish that our little church, with our non traditional sanctuary and our non traditional messages might evolve more with a 'WorshipArts' platform that would include different forms of worship, dramatic, musical, artistic. For when God is the focus of the message, all of these mediums are simply another form of prayer.

During this month of January when we are still in pandemic hibernation as we await the breath of spring and the promise of rebirth, I would ask you to pray on this message and to see if you hear God's answer.
